Contact- Changes in the offing

As you will have noticed on our paper copy of Contact, the cover has lost colour. This is an economy measure designed to save approximately £300 a year. In addition our risograph has become unreliable and may fail completely at any moment.

The replacement is a much less expensive item but this brings its own problems regarding preparation and printing. It is regarding both processes that I am seeking help.

Exactly how things will unfold is not yet clear but we will have to replace the "stapling team" who are retiring at the end of the year. My best estimate is that the printing and stapling as a combined exercise will take a little over four hours and will be carried out in the vestry and adjacent church hall. The total volume of work is approximately four hours work four times per year divided up in any number of ways. This will depend on the number of people willing to give time for part or all of each session.

I would ask anyone interested in helping to contact me. I would hope to arrange an on site meeting of potential helpers to look over the task and judge how much time they are willing and able to devote to the task.

RELAY FOR LIFE, WE WILL MAKE A DIFFERENCE FROM NODDING ACQUAINTANCES TO BECOMING FRIENDS

This was a secondary benefit of becoming a member of the Max West Team formed to raise funds for Relay for Life Cancer Research. This type of Project is certainly good for the Church Family. At its April Meeting the Deacons Court agreed that the Church should enter a Team for the Relay for Life 24 hour rally on the 17/18th July.

I MacPhee acted along with 24 other members, four of whom were Church members. The Team started fund raising for Cancer Research. They spread their net far and wide by contacting friends and acquaintances. Donations were obtained from as far a field as Hampshire in the south and Aberdeen in the north and remarkably, one member received a donation from Australia. This greatly assisted us in reaching the exceptional sum we achieved. With the fantastic generosity of Max West Members and the help of others who greatly assisted at a Coffee Morning and Baking Stall at the event The Team has now reached the outstanding total of £8500 for Cancer Research. As two thirds of this was Gift aided, an additional sum of £1420 will be realised which Relay for Life can use for Cancer Research.

The main event took place at Park Farm on the 17/18th July starting with a fly past of an elderly Dakota, at 11 am Saturday. Following this 85 Survivors made a lap of honour (this included a number of Max West members) followed by the 27 teams participating. Members of each Team then took it in turn to continually walk round the track for 24 hours with the climax being at 11pm when over 500 candle bags were placed around the Track, in remembrance of, or in thanksgiving for, loved ones. After a minute's silence, over 500 team members and visitors made a silent circuit of the Track which was very moving and special.

The total funds raised by the event in Dumfries have now reached a fantastic £70,000. The organization was completely in the hands of volunteers. The equipment on the field donated free of charge by local businesses.

Every penny of this goes to Cancer Research Scotland to assist in finding new treatments for Cancer.

The motto of Relay for Life is **WE WILL MAKE A DIFFERENCE**. THE Max West Team with members' assistance has greatly helped in this objective.

The Mission and Discipleship Committee of the Church of Scotland has made a series of DVDs known as THREADS. They are people who are doing what they are doing, not to impress but because Christ has made an impression, an indelible impression. Each of the episodes in this series of 8 DVDs lasts about 20 minutes and discussion material is available with each episode to aid conversation that hopefully will develop. Although different in many ways, advisors have some things in common: they are good listeners, team players, non-judgmental, enjoy helping all types of people, are willing to learn new skills, will commit 4-6 hours each week, and feel good about the difference they make.

You don't need special skills or knowledge as your bureau will give you all the training you need.

The role is varied, some of the things you will learn to do include:

Use Advisernet, the CAB Service electronic system, to give information to clients.

- Explain the choices faced by clients.
- Offer help with letters, phone calls and form filling.
- Make calculations about benefits.
- Refer clients to other agencies if they are better placed to help.

Being a volunteer adviser can seem a little daunting, but don't worry, you will get all the help you require. We have created a comprehensive, integrated training programme to prepare you for advising.

We are currently adding a "Financial Education" module to our programme which will include training to enable you to assist clients with budgeting and other financial problems. Glory in the Glen: A History of Evangelical Revivals in Scotland 1880-1940

This book is an engaging read on several levels giving the author's historical account and thought provoking analysis of events that have transformed the spiritual and physical landscapes in our towns and villages.

In this book Tom Lennie fills a gap in Scottish Church history. Despite its lengthy analysis involving a "spiritual awakening" or "revitalizing" within churches within an area which contrasts with the smooth flow of daily life, Lennie provides a reminder that Christian conversion is above all, a supernatural work.

Describing the Lewis revivals from first-hand accounts, Lennie brings to this book, stories of dramatic Christian conversion, great fervour for Christ, great numbers of conversions, and prayer meetings lasting for several days at a time. His description of the fishermen's revival of 1919-23 when the gospel came by sea from the fishing ports of East Anglia up the east coast of England and Scotland as far as Wick and Orkney, allowed me to make sense of why particular denominations were so well established in these areas and at least make sense of the stories of revival that I had heard when I lived in Wick some years ago.

Revival accounts, some great and some small cover much of Scotland but all have left their mark on our church buildings. Fascinating as these accounts are, it is in the spiritual sphere that this book holds the strongest message. The Saviour tells us in John 3 that we must be re-born of the Spirit and it is in Acts 9 that we get such a powerful example of what this means through his description or the conversion of Saul. Saul, the persecutor or Christ became His chief witness in the early years of the church through a meeting with the risen Christ that left him blind, speechless, and changed. The descriptions in Lennie's book of Christian conversion contain such examples of the transforming power of God that are in almost all instances preceded by a praying people.
