The Session

The Kirk session met on the 15th September under the chairmanship of the Interim Moderator, the Rev Donald Campbell. Several routine items of business were transacted.

One item, "Planning for the future," will require further discussion at our next meeting. This is an initiative from Presbytery which requires us to produce our vision statement for the use of Church buildings. It requires a three month census to find our current level of activity. If the Session Clerk should be seen counting heads on a Sunday that will explain his mysterious leaning over the balcony each week.

We welcomed seven new members who joined by Profession of faith on 5th September. Reports on our Kenya activities were received (reported in detail in this edition). It was noted that there will be a future concert by Brightons Church Praise Group in aid of funds for Kenya. It was also noted that our "Souper Sunday" had helped the national total for the Church of Scotland HIV/Aids Project to exceed one million pounds.

Deacons Court

The Deacons court met on the 23rd of September. The treasurer's report centred on the results of our recent Celebration of Giving. The overall picture is complex and a final assessment remains some way off. There has been a significant rise in the number of members contributing by direct debit and accompanying "Gift Aid". A note of caution was injected - our expenses are going up too.

The Finance Committee requested and received approval for increases to charges levied for weddings and funerals held in the Church. There was extensive discussion of the future production of Contact, not least the matter of the cover. There was support for an attempt to continue with colour. The possibility of outsourcing the production of a colour cover, printing and stapling is under review. Hopefully a decision will be forthcoming in the near future.

Stewardship Programme 2010 - Report on Financial Progress

I am aware that by the time you receive this it will have been 6 months since our Stewardship Programme came to a conclusion with our very successful Member Gatherings and well over a year since the inception of our activities commenced, with the first meeting of our Planning Group having been held in September 2009. I therefore felt it was important to update everyone, from a financial point of view, on the progress made so far with your responses.

It will take a good few months more before we see, and can quantify, any difference in increased income coming through from the commitments made by members to our Weekly Freewill Offering envelopes, Standing Orders or the Gift Aid Declarations, the benefits of which will take longer to materialize. However I can already see that the number of members with recorded giving, i.e. giving by way of Envelopes or Standing Order, has increased by 30 to 313 representing a more than 9% increase. The overall percentage of our congregation members who now have recorded giving has risen from 44% to 48% and the number of members having signed Gift Aid Declarations for these commitments has risen by 28 to 220 representing an increase of over 14%. There are also additional Gift Aid Declarations held for members who give periodic donations by cheque.

I am conscious that percentages and numbers paint a complicated picture. In order to establish a clearer pattern of our actual income, it may be helpful to know that the total income our church received from our Sunday Offerings and Standing Orders in July, August and September 2009 amounted to £13,506 and for the exact same period this year i.e. after our stewardship programme, amounted to £18,130. Early indications are therefore very positive and if this figure is annualised, it equates to an additional income of some £18,500. Such an outcome will obviously stem the outflow of funds we have been encountering in recent years and should hopefully enable our Finance Committee and Deacons Court to make some recommendations and decisions on such issues as whether to start replenishing the £30,000 in funds drawn recently from the Fabric Appeal Fund for the substantial Manse roof repair carried out this year, or to place funds into our Reserves, as and when surplus funds become available for any future worthy projects.

May I finish by saying that the success of our Stewardship Programme will undoubtedly make my job a little easier as we move forward but it has been the result of a lot of work put in by a lot of people. Everyone has worked tirelessly in pulling everything together and it is great to see the endeavours of so many being rewarded. I am not usually one to single people out for special mention but I would on this occasion wish especially to thank our Consultant, Edith Scott, for her invaluable input and our very own Val Coltart and Patricia Jardine for their efforts in coordinating matters. Thank you all very much for your ongoing contributions which are very much appreciated in continuing to help in ensuring the financial future of our Church is secure, at least in the short term.

A Tale of Two Elders

As we stood together that Sunday on 13th June 2004 and took our vows and were duly ordained elders of Maxwelltown West Church, little did we know that exactly 6 years later we would again stand together and deliver presentations to our congregation at the Celebrations of Giving on 13th June 2010. Patricia and I have been on an incredible journey that has been sustained by our deep love and commitment to our church.

Our friendship began those six years ago as we shared a room when we undertook an elders' course at the Church of Scotland's Carberry Tower in East Lothian. What an amazing weekend that was as we both met so many interesting people from all walks of life, who had come together to understand more of what was expected of us all as new elders. Together we attended workshops and wonderful services of singing and prayer in Carberry's beautiful little church. It was a truly inspiring weekend and we came back to Maxwelltown West full of energy and drive for our work ahead.

We were both fortunate to be given full Districts and so we began to fulfil our roles as elders as we busily set about establishing relationships with the members on our District lists. I know that we both find this aspect of our elders' duties rewarding especially when visiting the housebound or elderly. We are both ever mindful of the vital link we are providing between them and the church. We both diligently attend Session meetings and it was at one such meeting that the Stewardship programme was decided upon. As we both felt strongly about the survival of our church, we had no hesitation in putting ourselves forward to be part of the Planning Team, and indeed ended up jointly chairing the whole programme. Now the fun really did begin.

Patricia and I also share a great love of the outdoors and we are also keen on keeping fit. It seemed natural, therefore, to try to combine these interests and so began a 10-month period in our lives when we decided to go out running together and conduct our many stewardship meetings on the hoof, so to speak. This proved to be a great success as we pounded the streets of Dumfries all the time discussing the many issues that had to be dealt with as the programme developed. So successful were these running meetings that we decided to enter the Women's 10K run in Bellahouston Park, Glasgow on 9th May 2010. We were delighted that we completed the run in under the hour - a truly great experience, as over 13,000 women took part.

Shortly thereafter, the Stewardship Programme came to fruition and the Celebrations of Giving took place over 3 days in June in Maxwelltown West Church. We are confident that the programme will be a success and that the future of our beloved church will be sustained. Difficult times lie ahead for us as a congregation and never more so was this evidenced by the devastating news of our Minister's illness. We both pray for his speedy return to good health. At the time of writing, Patricia and I continue to pound the streets and forest paths. No doubt another project will present itself to us but meantime, we take pride in reflecting on what we hope was a job well done.

News from Mathia

One of the memorable acts of fellowship that we were part of during our visit to Mathia, Kenya was an afternoon spent at the Ndina Tea Factory workers' wing accommodation. Here in the welcoming company of many of the workers and their families, we heard a moving account by a young student of Veterinary Studies of how the Maxwelltown Bursary Fund had helped her in her chosen career. Here was the fund "brought to life". I know that we were all inspired and humbled by what we heard that afternoon in such company.

This year's Bursary Fund has been shared by nine young people from Mathia in higher education. Here is information on seven of the students which I thought would be of interest:

- Alex Karuoya Njeru John and Esther's eldest son is in his fourth year at Maseno University
 undertaking a BSc in Ecotourism, Hotel and Institutional Management. "The money has seen
 me through the journey of my academic life, enabling my parents to have an easier time
 managing my expenses for the school and my brother's High School fees. Thank you once
 again".
- James Gakua Mattenge: at Kenyatta University studying for a Bachelor of Commerce Degree. "These funds have seen me in payment of some part of my fees and also purchasing reading materials. Thank you and may God bless you abundantly".
- Prisaua Wamartha: a second year at Kenyatta University studying for a degree in Commerce "May God be with you in everything you do"
- Josephine Mwangi: Student at Egerton University studying for a BSc. In Animal Science. Josephine is in her final year and her dream is to one day be one of the researchers in animal genetics. "Thanks to the financial assistance of Maxwelltown West Church I can see this dream becoming reality".
- Vivian Mwihaki: is in his second year at Moi University studying for a degree in Applied Statistics with Computing. "By God's grace I believe I will excel. God bless you and thank you".
- Geoffrey Maina: is a fourth year student at Egarton University studying for a BSc. in Commerce. He hopes go on to study for an MBA after graduation. "Being an orphan your donation has been a great aid to my guardian as the burden of school fees has been eased. You have greatly transformed my academic life".

Heartfelt thanks to all who contributed to the Bursary Fund. Alex Njeru says that the mission of the young leaders of Mathia Church is to strive to make this world a better place. The Youth section of Mathia Church- members up to the age of 25 - is a thriving organisation, with 62 of their representatives due to attend a Youth Conference shortly. In a recent e-mail, Alex, son of John Njeru

who visited us in 2008, asked if any of our young people were interested in making contact with the Mathia Church young people. Please contact me if you would like to be involved.

On Sunday 31st October 2010 Mathia Church is holding a Gift Day, hoping to raise 1 million Kenyan Shillings- about £8,000- to enable the congregation to complete the building of their new church, which so far has taken eight years. Since our visit in 2009 they have put in half of the windows at a cost of 200,000 Kenyan Shillings. 5 million Kenyan Shillings later, the building is half finished.

We wish them well with this ambitious undertaking, and remember all our friends in Kenya in our thoughts and prayers.

Booming Business in Bondo

This is our humanitarian project which we have now been supporting for 3 years after Winnie, a lady from Sondo, Kenya visited Maxwelltown West while on holiday with family from London and asked for help. Now a widow and retired from business, she returned to her home village to help the people in extreme poverty. She has started 4 nursery schools with 300 children, mostly orphans as a result of HIV Aids.

After Rosemary and lan visited the first time and confirmed the community had absolutely nothing, we set up a feeding programme, followed by a deep well which provided clean water and more healthy people. Next were 2 toilets for nursery schools, shoes, mosquito nets, books and games. Following this was the water pump which now helps 15 farmers to irrigate and grow crops such as beans, tomatoes, onions, and melons. They keep half for family and sell the rest locally. The goat project is very popular and now 16 families benefit. The agreement to donate the first kid back to the project has worked well and is "self funding" without using actual cash.

LATEST NEWS: Many small businesses are prospering now with the money which was donated to them by Max West this year. For example: fishing boats and nets, provision for drying the fish for sale, food stalls and more. They are borrowing a little money, given 3 months credit which Winnie controls and recycles the profit into other projects. She hopes eventually to save enough to buy a Tuk Tuk to transport the produce to a market in a town near Bondo which would give a greater profit than locally. She also hopes to grow fruit soon and now has banana plants. The toilet for the 3rd Nursery school is almost finished and we hope to provide the 4th soon.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL now has books for the children in their own language (Luo) bought in Kisumu from a Christian shop which we are glad to know about. This also came from a Max West donation. The WCT are delighted with the progress our funding is making and quite cautious in allocating our hard earned funds. You can be assured that all money received from you is sent directly to Winnie with no middle person involved. We take guidance from Winnie as to the requirements most needed. We receive a balance sheet from her every 6 months and are satisfied with this.

The FOOD MONEY donated still only provides the children with one substantial meal a month. We hope as the community becomes more self-sufficient this will no longer be a concern.

WINNIE'S FINAL WORDS: "Nothing works as well as empowering a community. Please rest assured we will develop and continue to better our lives. God Bless Max. West for giving us so much hope in life."

PS: The Concert on 20th November by Brighton's Church Falkirk will be in aid of our Kenyan Projects. We do hope our church members will support this. The last concert by Brighton's was well received and enjoyed. Tickets £5. per person, £10 for a family regardless of how many children and a light supper is included after the concert. WCT have tickets or pay at the door.
