Session

The Session met on 16th March.

Mr. Gavin Elliott, Ministries Support Officer of the Church, advised on the issue of Mr. Savage's phased return to work and related procedures and time scale.

Plans for the proposed visit of Winnie Owour from Kenya were discussed at length. J Love and B Riddick were appointed to represent Maxwelltown West on the Dumfries Christian Network (DCN), and it was noted that J Love had completed his term of office as Convener of the DCN.

I Slack has intimated his resignation from the Session and the Deacons' Court. The Session expressed their appreciation of his long and distinguished service.

A Committee was appointed to review the Church Membership Roll.

The Session met again on 19th April.

The World Church Team reported a number of successful ventures. These included a coffee morning in support of Winnie's visit to Dumfries, which had raised £850. In addition there were direct contributions to Bondo and Mathia.

Reports of annual visits to organisations were generally satisfactory, though it was noted that many of the young people within our youth organisations had no family connection with the congregation. The resignation of Rev. Colin Sutherland was noted and his help during a difficult time for the congregation was acknowledged.

Two chairs had been obtained on loan from the former Buittle Church, to assess their suitability flanking the Communion Chair in Maxwelltown West.

The Session meets again on 22nd June.

Deacons' Court

The Court met on 3rd March.

The principal item of business was the approval of the Trustees' Report and Accounts for 2010. The Treasurer, D McNay, presented a review of the accounts. The essence of his review was that, despite changes in presentation dictated by OSCR, our position has improved greatly as a result of the stewardship programme. Details have been presented to members at the Annual Meeting and make interesting, if somewhat complex, reading.

B Riddick gave his fourteenth and final report as Fabric Convener. Once again, a great deal has been achieved at relatively modest cost, due to skillful purchasing of services and the help of volunteers. The Court unanimously thanked him for his lengthy and successful management of the fabric of the church.

The Court held a further meeting on 27th April.

The most important item was the Treasurer's report covering the first quarter of this year. D McNay described an improving situation and despite a short term deficit, the overall picture was encouraging.

The amount raised from the Fabric Box Collection was £921.83.

The issue of reviving a programme of social events was deferred till the next meeting, in the absence of the sponsor.

The Court will meet again on 22nd June.

God Knows!

On my daily (if it's not raining!) walk recently, as usual my ears were plugged by the earphones of my Sony Walkman (so old it plays cassettes: younger readers may not have heard of them!) That day I was listening to songs from "Joseph and His Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat", originally a short piece written for a school concert but expanded into a full-blown stage show. I've seen it a few times and always thought it had great music linking its Bible story. But on that walk, hearing it again, I was struck by how great the original story was, depicting in its characters a huge range of human strengths, weaknesses, achievements and failings.

Read the story again in Genesis, 35, 37, 39-45, to see what I mean. Take Joseph's father, Jacob: pious, but also stupid, asking for trouble by so obviously making Joseph his favourite son; later he feels sorrow, fear, worry, happiness, gratitude: what a mixture! Joseph's brothers? – envy, if understandable, treachery, greed, lies, disbelief, relief. And Joseph? – on the one hand proud, self-

important, deceitful; on the other wise, tender, forgiving, generous. Again, what a mixture! So here we see a remarkable variety of the good and bad in our human nature.

My grandson Calum's favourite song is "My God is a Great Big God". He is. And because God created us, He knows us. More than that, He has also been one of us in Jesus, who had to face so many contradictions in those he met, from devoted joy to devious hatred. So don't be fooled into thinking that God is ignorant of, or oblivious to, all our mixed-up human thoughts and actions. He's not. God knows!

Two thoughts on all this. The first is that Jesus, on the cross, asks his Father to forgive the very people who are crucifying His only Son: surely that's a prayer made in the faith that God can forgive all of our sins, even to the farthest extent to which human evil can go. The second is that in "Eli Jenkins' Prayer", or "Sunset Poem" (which I sing with Dumfries Male Voice Choir) are the Dylan Thomas lines:

"We are not always bad or good who live our lives under Milk Wood; But Thou, I know, will be the first to see our best side, not our worst".

This is our God, our Great Big God. And God knows! He knows what we're like, understands us, looks for the best in us in His love, and forgives the sins we can't even forgive ourselves. And (God knows!) we should all be glad about that.
