At last, with the visit of a team from the Presbytery Ministry and Resources Committee, we take the first steps in the process of progressing the vacancy. In the present climate of ministerial shortages we have no idea how long this might take. I would ask that you make this a matter of priority in all your prayers that the right person might be called to Maxwelltown West.

Since it is so long since you have needed to look for a Minister I would ardently suggest that you make opportunities to go and visit other Churches and see how much things have changed. It may be a steep curve of revelation!!!

In the meantime, it is my continuing privilege to serve as your Locum. We are fortunate to have so many people who willingly give of their time and talents to keep our work and witness moving forward. Let us look forward in faith, believing that God's plans for us are good.

Kirk Session

The Kirk Session met on 13th September when a number of items were discussed.

It was agreed that we should ordain five new elders and this duly took place on 16th September when the Interim Moderator, Rev. D. Campbell ordained S Crossan, R Fraser, B Shepherd, D Wood and J Wood. All have been welcomed at Session meetings

It was also agreed to hold the Congregational Meeting for the Election of Deacons on Sunday 18th November. With the recent ordination we are now left with eleven vacancies on the Deacons' Court.

The other main item was a continued discussion of our approach to the vacancy caused by the death of Rev. G. Savage. It was reported that we would receive a visit by members of the Presbytery Ministries and Resources Committee. This meeting duly took place on 11th October and involved a wide ranging discussion at the end of which it was overwhelmingly agreed that we wish to call a minister without restriction. Members of the Committee will convey this desire to Presbytery and we will now await Presbytery's response.

Deacons' Court

The Deacons' Court met on 25 September 2012 when the Rev Liz Mack chaired the meeting. She opened the meeting by welcoming S Crossan and D Wood, new elders, to their first meeting. She then read a passage from James about 'faith without good deeds', and followed this with prayer.

D McNay, Treasurer, gave his report and detailed the comparison for the same 3-month period last year and was happy to tell us that the church finances were in a satisfactory position, which he said was key to replacing some of the £50,000 spent on the manse roof and the new organ.

R Slack, Finance Convener, intimated that £871.21 had been realised from the Fabric Fund Box Appeal and she thanked D McNay for organising the count.

The matter of the manse garden was discussed and it was agreed that the present gardener, employed by the Savage family, would be willing to continue and would be paid for 3 hours per week at £7 per hour. B Wilson had agreed to liaise with the gardener. B Riddick had resigned from the Fabric Committee following his resignation as Fabric Convener. He was thanked for his work and the support he had given the Finance Committee over many years.

Correspondence had been received from various groups requesting the use of the halls for their winter sessions. These were all approved. An enquiry had been received from Parkinsons UK to start a singing group and approval was given for them to use our halls. J Smith had written to thank members for allowing the use of the halls for the Relay for Life event held earlier in the year.

D Miller gave the Fabric Report. There was much discussion about the position at the manse. D Miller and his team had covered all areas of concern to ensure that every aspect had been covered in the current situation.

Remedial work had been done in the Vestry. J McNaught and his family should be thanked for permitting access to their garden to allow repairs to be carried out to the roof area at the vestry.

An Extract from Gordon's Eulogy, Sunday 23rd September 2012

Gordon enjoyed his family, especially time spent with David and Alasdair. I recall when they were both very young, Gordon would have meetings or visits most evenings, but there were very few nights when he missed bathtime and he always managed to read bedtime stories to them. Those of you who remember Gordon's talk on favourite books will recall the different voices he used. This was a common occurrence in our house. I often heard squeals of delight coming from the boys' bedrooms as Gordon took on the guise of characters from Great Expectations, Kidnapped, Treasure Island, David Copperfield, Harry Potter and his favourite A Child's Garden of Verse by Robert Louis Stevenson.

It was impossible for us not to be aware of Gordon's work ethic. He instilled this in David and Alasdair, along with a deep sense of duty. He expected them to treat all people with respect and to show interest in others. Gordon was a traditionalist at heart but was aware how important it is to embrace change when change is beneficial to the Glory of God. He came across as quite a serious man but he had a great sense of humour and an infectious laugh. Those who attended the annual visit to the Pantomime in Glasgow will recognise this side to Gordon.

He loved Maxwelltown West and you, his people. He always made himself available and took a great interest in your lives. He found it a privilege to be part of the important events of your lives. When we knew he only had a limited time left on this earth, his first thoughts were for his family, closely followed by his concern for this congregation. He hoped that you would continue to grow spiritually and to have closure so that you can look

forward to a new chapter in the congregational life. He wasn't a vain man, but he felt loved by you and appreciated that, after 28 years as your minister, looking forward wasn't going to be easy. However I know his wish for you was to find a new minister who can help you continue to grow in your spiritual life.

David, Alasdair and I want to thank you for all the love and support you have shown us, not just since Gordon died but indeed for all the years we lived in the Manse. As some of you know we have moved house and are happy in our new home but we will never forget our time in the Manse nor the way you looked after us and gave us a wonderful home to live in.

Since our involvement with Bondo in 2007, progress continues to be made through the Usenge Development Initiative (UDI), the Charity drawn up and overseen by the committee we deal with in Bondo. In recent months 2 additional dry toilets and one deep well have been constructed and their co-operative arrangement, initiated by ourselves, has enabled them to start many small businesses, build a small Church and new classrooms. Among projects contemplated are a beehive business and a library to assist in the education and religious study of the original 300 orphans in 2007 and 250 additional orphans since then, which are currently being supported by the UDI. A spokesperson recently wrote to us saying 'Believe me, community empowerment economically and educationally is comparable to nothing else.'

The World Church Team wishes to thank everyone who is supporting our two projects in Kenya and will welcome enquiries from anyone interested in assisting the two communities.

Greetings from John and Banice, now safely home in Mathia, Kenya

John writes, "We thank the entire Max West church for the lively welcome and warm hospitality we received from everyone at church and in the organisations we visited. It was wonderful for us to meet so many people and to participate in your services which we did not expect or take for granted. This made Banice and I feel part of your church family. Especially thanks to Rev. Liz Mack who was a real blessing to us."

The feedback from this visit has been positive in both directions; sharing worship, concerns and fellowship has built on our friendship and trust with each other for the future. Higher education is greatly sought after in Kenya. The people in our partner church in Mathia see an increasing need for higher education for their children. Since 2009, we at Maxwelltown West have sent a bursary of £1,000 each year which has enabled Mathia students to take advantage of higher education courses at a number of universities. To date, five students have successfully graduated, with a further nine students continuing their studies. Here are examples of Mathia students who have benefitted from the bursary:

<u>Washington Kimari Mwariki</u> (University of Nairobi) "I have already received from you 19,500 KS (approx. £160) to help me pay for my fees in my first semester. I'm so appreciative for your support which has given me hope......."

<u>Geoffrey Mania</u> (graduated Dec. 2011 - Egerton University - B. Business and Management Accountancy) "May He who gives, expand forthwith and nourish your helping hands".

Boniface Murangi Wachira (4th year, Moi University - B. Tourism/Management) "I wish to chase my dream by starting up a small firm in tourism - maybe facilitating a visit from Maxwelltown West!"

Memories of Our Old Church Organ

I joined Maxwelltown West Church in my late teens when Miss Stark was still our Church Organist. She retired soon after and in 1947, Jim Sewell from Annan took up the reins. He was very dynamic and loved our church organ.

As we had two services each Sunday, there were calls for new members for the choir and, as this was before television and other distractions, we soon had over thirty members. Our practice on a Friday evening was the highlight of the week. We were taught a number of church cantatas, including Handel's Messiah. On the Sunday of our performance we had a full membership and an overflowing church. I think Jim played every key on the organ and with the sound vibrating from the pipes, mingled with our voices, the rafters rang.

Another memorable occasion was when we were invited to sing at the laying of the foundation stone for Lincluden Church in 1951 (choir without church organ.)

During one evening service, I observed a young man in the congregation. Again we had a request for new members and at the following Friday evening practice, this same young man was standing right behind me. It was obvious to all he hadn't a very good singing voice. Jim eventually asked him why he had joined the choir and he replied "to be introduced to the young lady standing in front of me". To the laughter of all the other members and my total embarrassment, Jim performed this task. He also played our church organ at our wedding three years later in 1953. Our daughter, Marion, was christened in Max West Church in 1956 and our son, Gordon, in 1959, all with the help of our church organ.

In 1966, during our Church's Centenary celebrations, Brown Owl, Jenny Morley, wrote appropriate words to an old hymn tune and asked little Brownie Marion, aged 10, to sing it accompanied by our church organ. Time moves on, as did all our choir members, leaving such happy memories behind and our organist, Jim, was replaced by our faithful John Brown.

In 1996, I again walked down the aisle on my son's arm, with my son-in-law playing our old church organ, to say my last farewell to my precious husband, aged 69.

Our faithful old church organ also began to show its age and when the decision was made to move its position, it just retired, like all its old friends, the choir members.

What Can We Do?

If we attempt to provide concern and compassion to those in need we will be fulfilling the statement made by Jesus – 'Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did it for me.' An old maxim states 'I am only one but I am one. I cannot do everything but I can do something. What I can do I ought to do and what I ought to do by the grace of God I will do.'

A prayer from a book I have been reading:

'Gracious Lord, I know that your eyes are always upon me to guide and protest and bless and correct. You have given me eyes too. Grant me the power to use them to truly SEE. Help me see those you have put in my path, really see them, with all their hurts, their desires, their longings, their needs, their joys and their challenges. As you open my eyes, prompt me to open wide my arms to offer whatever help and encouragement I have to give. In Jesus' name I pray. Amen.

What can we do this Christmas to sow the seed of hope in someone?

The Last Olympic Report from London 2012

On 27th July I had to check in by 6.30am, ready for the morning briefing and the start of the early shift. Everyone seemed bright and cheerful, as the Opening ceremony would be in the evening. During the lunch break I got a picture under the Olympic rings. My shift ended at 2.30pm, but as I had no television at the flat, I decided to do a double shift so that I could be in the Village where the excitement would

Two others and I went to the post office for the Opening ceremony stamps. We saw Tom Daley and one of our group managed to take a secret photo of him. During the evening, we had a walk around the village and saw Usain Bolt, also the England football team manager. Unfortunately Team GB was not out of their accommodation as they were not due to leave the village until 11.45pm.

On the 28th July, while heading for lunch, there was a surprise visit by the Queen, Prince Philip, Princess Anne and Comm. Tim Lawrence. What a joy.

What was really good during the games was the chance to speak to the other Gamesmakers. I had a long chat to a member of the Iraqi team about how the common people were suffering from the various wars over the last 30 years. It is a rich country, but the population were not benefitting from this. They also need the support of psychologists.

On one day we were all given a village pin badge. It had a limited supply. My last day was on 31st July. I met an Australian television team on the tube and they gave me and two others Fortel pin badges.

It was sad to be the last day for my experience at the Olympics. The other Scottish member of the team and I were leaving and we were given a goody bag which contained a Gamesmaker baton and gold, silver and bronze McDonalds Gamesmaker badges. It was off to the pub for a last drink together before splitting up.

I travelled home on the train in my Gamesmaker uniform to see how it would be accepted. No one spoke or asked questions, so that did not feel good after the buzz in London. Stephen Rowe were running an Olympic theme when I got back, so I wore my uniform to work and again felt disappointed by the lack of any hype in Dumfries, compared with down south.

The great thing during the games was the appreciation given to the Gamesmakers and we appreciated the thanks. The London parade of athletes on the 10th August was the last get together for the Gamesmakers.

On the 13th September there was a farewell event for the people who had worked in the village, with speeches from the LOCOG MD and Tony Sainsbury, entertainment and access to the athletes' dining hall. Now we have been asked to volunteer for Glasgow 2014. The whole event has opened doors to other events. It has been such a wonderful and unique experience - well worth being a volunteer.


19 girls took part in a Highlands and Islands sleepover in the Church hall in early October, with most asleep by 12.30am!!
