MAXWELLTOWN WEST MISSION STATEMENT

Maxwelltown West Church seeks to be a place of welcome to all in our parish; a centre of Christian worship and fellowship. We seek to provide a framework for family life and a place where young people may be nurtured in Christian values.

You will see from the update from our Interim Moderator the ongoing problems and processes our Session is faced with as we seek to find, with Presbytery, an acceptable way forward for Maxwelltown West in calling a new Minister.

With the huge dearth of Ministers and continuing financial constraints in the Church in general, all kinds of measures are being considered to resolve the problems. Things sadly "ain't what they used to be!!" The reluctant acceptance by Session of the only real offer by the Ministry and Resources Committee of a 7 year reviewable tenure may not be what we hoped for but after all this time of stalemate it is perhaps our best hope of proceeding on our own to try to call our own Minister. And hopefully after the next meeting of Presbytery at the end of September, if approved, we might begin that process. We accept that in the future adjustment may have to be made.

So, with a glimmer of light on the horizon to lift our spirits we can go forward in faith.

Perhaps it is appropriate that this summer series has been looking at the beautiful letter from Paul to his beloved Church in Philippi. It is a letter of joy and there are so many parts of it that we might take and hold for ourselves. Let me pick out just a few.

Chapter 1: "I thank my God every time I remember you; in all my prayers I pray with joy because of your partnership in the Gospel." Is this not the very essence of our commitment - to be partners in spreading and living the Gospel? Then a word of great encouragement - "being confident that He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion." Christ is not going to walk away from us as He will bring His work in us to completion.

Then in chapter 2: "If you have found encouragement in being united with Christ then try to imitate His behaviour." Our attitude should be as His. And at verse 12, the great exhortation of John Calvin - "work out your own salvation for it is God who is working in you according to His good purpose." We need to keep active in faith and service - our part in God's agreement.

In chapter 3: "Forgetting what lies behind and straining to what lies ahead to win the prize in Christ." We dare not harp back to the past, but strive to our future.

"Be anxious for nothing but take everything in prayer, with thanksgiving, to God." He alone can give us the strength we need and finally the wonderful Blessing we will find "the peace of God which transcends all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus."

There is nothing I can add to these wonderful words. Read them often, pray consistently and let us together work towards the goal Christ has in mind for us.

An update from the Interim Moderator

It is some time since I have written with an update and that is because there has been little really to say. The Kirk Session is still in conversation with Presbytery's Ministry and Resources Committee about the future of Maxwelltown West but no real progress has been made.

When I last wrote with an update in Contact I reported that the Kirk Session had until Presbytery met on 26th June to come up with alternative proposals. The only realistic proposal that the Kirk Session could see was a linkage with Lochend and New Abbey. This proposal was taken to the Kirk Session of Lochend and New Abbey but the office bearers rejected that proposal preferring to look for a minister on their own. This is not surprising since they had just been given permission by Presbytery to buy a new manse and extend it in preparation for a new ministry. This effectively meant that the Kirk Session of Maxwelltown West were unable to pursue any realistic alternative.

In the absence of any realistic alternative proposal it was the intention of the Ministry and Resources Committee to recommend a seven year reviewable tenure ministry for Maxwelltown West to the June meeting of Presbytery. However they decided not to do so in order to put forward an alternative suggestion of their own, namely that Maxwelltown West consider working more closely with the congregation of Dumfries Northwest, perhaps leading to a union of the two parishes and a full-time unrestricted ministry which would see the current minister of Dumfries Northwest becoming minister of the new united charge.

The Kirk Session discussed this suggestion and for a number of reasons decided to reject it as a realistic way forward for Maxwelltown West. They have instead agreed that it would be best to accept a ministry on the basis of a seven year reviewable tenure rather than delay calling a minister any longer and have communicated this to the Ministry and Resources Committee. We now await a response from that committee but in any case nothing will be decided before the next meeting of Presbytery which is 25th September.

I realise that many of you may be frustrated by the length of time this process is taking but I would urge continued patience (which is of course a fruit of the Spirit) and ask again for your continued prayers for the Kirk Session and Presbytery that the correct way forward for Maxwelltown West may be discerned.

Kirk Session

The Kirk Session met for an ordinary meeting on 20th June when a number of items were discussed. This meeting should mainly have dealt only with routine items of business. However, representatives of the Presbytery Ministries and Resources Committee asked to attend the meeting to bring a proposal regarding the future of Maxwelltown West Church.

The proposal they brought was that we should unite with Dumfries North West Church with the incumbent there, Rev. Neil Campbell, becoming the minister for the new charge. This led to a full and frank discussion with no decision being reached at the meeting. Session agreed to have a meeting at a later date to discuss the proposal.

This meeting took place on 4th July when Session considered the previous proposal and after a lengthy discussion overwhelmingly agreed to reject the proposal. The Convener of the Presbytery Ministries and Resources Committee has been notified of this decision. We now await the next stage in the process of reaching a decision on our future.

The Fabric Committee made their annual inspection of the church and reported that maintenance work would continue as and when required. The Relevant Presbytery Committee has recently visited the Manse. They reported it to be in a good condition and ready for immediate use.

D. Rosie, on behalf of the Organ Fund Committee, thanked everyone for their help and support at the "Organ Concert". The meeting expressed its thanks to the two organists and the committee for all their hard work in making the event such a success.

The next meeting of the Deacons' Court will be Tuesday 24th September 2013.

World Church Team News from Bondo and Mathia

Bondo

Since 2007 our Bondo project continues to develop well and the community is progressing to become self sufficient.

Our Christmas catalogue gifts resulted in £140 to purchase more beehives. The bees were provided by the Kenyan Ministry of Agriculture and the first honey is expected in December. The Sunday school benefited by £110 for new books.

From their little businesses mainly the sale of tomatoes, cash has been raised for second water pump which they aim to complete soon.

The Ministry of Education has now officially registered the school which Winnie has set up. They were impressed to learn she has support and assistance from the Church of Scotland and that Max. West is sending a monthly donation to provide food for the children.

Our World Church Team is indebted to the sponsors who have constantly over the past 4 years enabled us to send £250 every month to the Usenge Development initiative, the charity set up by Winnie to assist in feeding 300 children and now approx 500.

Recently two classrooms and a kitchen have been added to the church building and we forwarded £260 to complete the roof before the rainy season begins. This donation was funded from a funeral collection which specified it was to be used for the benefit of the children of Bondo.

Winnie continues in every mailing to thank the people of Max West "for sowing the seeds hope in her community which allows them to see a brighter future ahead".

Mathia

Thanks to improved electronic connections and mobile phones our links with Mathia have become stronger. Senior elder John writes "It is with much joy I send warm greetings to the congregation of Max West from my family and Mathia Church. We are constantly praying for your Presbytery to help you find a new Minister".

Mathia church is running well and the congregation is growing in size. In fact their large parish will be subdivided on 8th September with the Moderator of the General Assembly presiding. Mathia will then have five congregations and Kagumo parish will have seven congregations. This will give Rev Erastus more time with Mathia which they are all looking forward to. John tells us the cost of this division is high therefore the completion of their new larger church will be delayed yet again.

Bursary grants from our own fundraising over the past five years have enabled over thirty young people into senior education and university. This November four people will graduate and five others continue their studies. Our help has been greatly appreciated and we hope it will continue for some time to come.

The WCT is aware of the wider World Mission work and traditionally Max. West has been involved with The Christian Aid door to door collection for many years.

The theme for this year was "Bite Back at Hunger" and organised by Heather Johnson with over 20 collectors in the parish. They raised £2,676 - a wonderful result for which we are indebted to everyone who donated and collected.

In September Ian and Rosemary Slack have decided to return to Bondo for the third time and Mathia for the second time.

The WCT is very grateful to them and look forward to their first hand news which will be reported to the congregation as well.

Some parting words from John Njeru Karuoya "What you do for yourself dies with you, but what you do for others will live for ever".

In the meantime, why not try out this wee game that you can play indoors or out, based on the story of David and Goliath which can be found in the Old Testament: 1 Samuel Chapters: 16 & 17

David and Goliath Game

Materials: Gather 5 small flat stones and 1 large flat stone

(Marbles can be used instead if preferred)

1 Permanent marker or poster paint

Masking tape or any other similar tape

Set up: Use the masking tape to stick a square shape on the floor

(The larger the square the more difficult it will be) Put a small cross in the centre of the square

Paint the stones different colours or just write names/initials on them as follows: G-goliath,

your names or initials on the others

How to Play:

The object of the game is to knock Goliath out of the square in the smallest amount of moves. Place his large stone on the X in the centre of the square then take turn about to slide your little stones at the large one in the centre and knock him out of the square. Some of you might be very good at this if you play marbles.

Alternatively each of you can add up how many times it takes you to knock him out then swap player. The winner is the one with the lowest number of throws. Have fun.....see if you can beat your Mums or Dad's score! **Tip:** You may wish to glue a piece of felt on the bottom of your stones if playing on a wooden floor to stop them getting scratched.

Try reading the story from your bible and answering the following questions:

- 1. What did David do when he didn't have much to do in the fields?
- 2. Why wasn't David in the army?
- 3. What did David use to protect himself against Goliath?

Remember:

God doesn't care about our age or outer appearances but looks at the heart. During the holidays try and do something nice for someone in your family but don't tell them. God will see what you do and will reward you for it someday! See You All Soon
