A Treasurer's Plea

Dear Friends in Max West,

I feel obliged to put pen to paper, (something I have to admit I am rarely in the habit of doing these days.) However, as Treasurer of our church, I felt it was extremely important I brought to everybody's attention that last year we spent almost £30,000 upgrading our old Organ to a brand new Digital Organ. I'm sure those of you who have heard it will agree that it is a very fine instrument which is a pleasure to listen to. Having said that, our previous pipe organ served Maxwelltown West Church extremely well for many years but it had become in need of extensive and very expensive repair.

Basic economics determine that when we spend money, we need to replace it. I am sure most of you will already know that we have an active Organ Fundraising Committee, led by David Rosie, who are currently trying to raise the much needed capital, so fundraising events will continue and hopefully be supported by you. However there is no doubt that if we had not had the benefit of a substantial donation from one of our members (who would prefer to remain anonymous) we would not be as near our target as we are.

With this in mind, if every current member of our congregation were now to donate just £15, which equates to less than 30p a week for a year, the remaining balance of approximately £9,000 would be exceeded. When you think about it, this is surely not a lot to ask to enable our church to be one of the very few here in Dumfries to have a super new organ, which will hopefully sustain our music for many years to come. If you feel you can, all I ask is that you place a donation, for whatever amount you consider appropriate, into the pre-addressed envelope enclosed with your Contact and return it to me via your elder or by handing it into the church the next time you are there, or by simply placing a stamp on it and popping it in the post. We would love to see the barometer (currently situated on a table behind the organ) which each week displays the amount we have raised, go crashing through the £30,000 target figure soon!

Kirk Session

The Kirk Session met for an ordinary meeting on 16th April when a number of items were discussed. It also met with the Presbytery Ministries and Resources Committee on 14th March.

You will remember that we have received two visits from members of the Presbytery Ministries and Resources Committee. After our meeting in December a committee was appointed by Session. That group's first report was presented to Session and it was agreed that we should continue to look at a link with New Abbey in the first instance. This approach was rebuffed by New Abbey and Lochend Church.

A written submission was sent to the convener of the Presbytery Ministries and Resources Committee. Subsequently three members of Presbytery visited us in March and this proved an extremely lively meeting. Session again strongly indicated its wish for an unrestricted call as contained within Presbytery's current plan, but the visiting group indicated its wish to continue the full six month consultation period agreed by Presbytery. We will now have to wait until the June meeting of Presbytery for a decision.

The April meeting mainly dealt with routine items of business. It received a very full report from the CHYPS Group which has provided much food for thought regarding young people in Maxwelltown West Church. However, it agreed to defer further work on it until the vacancy is resolved. The meeting received reports on visits to the various Church organisations which showed them all to be in good heart. These visits are an extremely important link with Session, providing it with an insight into the various groups linked to the Church.

Deacons' Court

The Deacons' Court met on 14th March 2013 as a Meeting of the Trustees to approve the Report and Financial Statement for the year ending 2012 ready for presentation to the Congregation, and to approve the proposed Fabric Budget for 2013.

The Court met again on 9th April 2013 for a full meeting. D McNay, the treasurer, gave his report for the first quarter of this year. During this period, income had exceeded expenditure, however due to the continuing low

interest rates the Fabric Fund account may need reviewing in the future. In the absence of the Finance Convenor, the treasurer informed the meeting that the Fabric Fund Box Count amounted to £736.09.

The meeting discussed the problems associated with parking on Rosemount Street. Due to the change of use of the former "Dalston" Hotel, we no longer have access for Disabled Parking there. I would ask that the more ablebodied of us, in future, try to park away from the rear entrance to the church, leaving the disabled and less ablebodied the spaces nearer the rear door. We have also received a complaint from a resident of Rosemount Street that people at times are parking across his driveway. Please consider the residents when parking.

D Wood gave the meeting an update on "Safe-Guarding". Those working with children and vulnerable people, including adults, should contact him and complete the new forms. It is essential that this is carried out for the protection of the vulnerable and ourselves.

As M Brown has now retired from tending the flower beds at the front of the Church, a vote of thanks was extended to her for her many years of service to the Church. During the coming months volunteers are sought to look after the flower beds and the Fabric Committee will look at the longer term future of this area.

A Beggs is to retire as the co-ordinator of the "After Service Tea and Coffee Rota" and we are seeking a volunteer to step in. Please Help!!!

Finally, on a personal note, I would like to thank everyone for their help and support, especially Eileen, and the Rev's. Liz and Donald since I took up the post of Clerk to the Deacons' Court. It has been, and still is, a steep learning curve getting to grips with the role but being part of the "Maxwest family" is very supportive.

What is WaterAid

WaterAid's vision is a world where everyone has access to safe water and sanitation. Surely these days this has to be a basic human right. Scottish Water's vision (for whom I work) is to inspire everybody connected with the organisation to feel emotionally and physically connected to WaterAid by delivering an outstanding grass roots, bottom up campaign that ignites a greater sense of ownership, passion and participation.

I am hopeful the quizzes in Dumfries will have inspired the community to dig deep.

WaterAid enables the world's poorest to gain access to safe water and sanitation. It works in 27 countries across Africa, Asia, the Pacific region and Central America, and to date has helped over 15 million people, which I think is a great effort.

WaterAid was founded by the UK Water Industry in 1981 and is now leading global water and sanitation charity, with a target of raising £100 million by 2015. Scottish Water plays a big part in this with an army of reps raising £1.5 million in the last 10 years.

Strategic Aims


- -To promote and secure poor people's rights and access to safe water, improved hygiene and sanitation.

The Building of Maxwelltown West Church



1850

The Laurieknowe area in 1850 was very different from now.

A new Free Church was to be commissioned and a design prepared by Mr. Barbour, architect, was selected and a site was obtained.



1893

By the 1893 map, the area had changed considerably. The following report on the building of the church is taken from the book 'Jubilee 1866 – 1916 Maxwelltown United Free Church' printed for the Deacons' Court.

"The whole work, exclusive of painting, was contracted for by Messrs Crackston & Sons, builders, Maxwelltown. The foundation stone was laid by Mr. A. Murray Dunlop, M.P. on the 6th of July, 1865; and the church thoroughly completed has just been publicly opened for the worship of God.

To Mr. Costin, painter, was entrusted the pictorial ornamentation of the interior, a task he has performed with admirable skill and taste. The building appears to be a model piece of masonry, reflecting the utmost credit on Messrs Crackston & Son.

We ought not to neglect to mention that the fine toned bell of the church was the gift of Mr. J. M. Henderson, manufacturer, and that the Baillie Tweddle gave, as his subscription, £20 for purchasing the heating apparatus. The contract price for the work of the mason, joiner, slater, plasterer, etc., was £1,888; the charge for painting, heating, grates, rails, and architect's fee will

be about £220; the price of the site was £165 – in all £2,273. This will leave a considerable margin of debt – probably £400 or more; but whilst thankfully acknowledging the liberality manifested by the people at the opening services, by the handsome collection of £56/14s, we trust that the collection to be taken at the services in the church tomorrow will also be on a large and liberal scale.

The church was opened by the Rev. Dr. Begg on Thursday, 15th November, at twelve o'clock. Though the day was wet and boisterous, nearly every seat was occupied, the country members of the congregation, no less than those of the town, turning out well."

Maxwelltown West Church Social Group

The MaxWest Social Group, which was created following a meeting on 1st March 2012, now consists of a total of 30 members and comprises a broad cross-section of the Church membership and also includes younger and older members, Elders and Deacons.

The Social Group has evolved during the past year and does not operate with a formal committee but has the following structure:-

- * A total of 5 members, who have volunteered to rotate as Chairpersons.
- * The Chairpersons have an agreed set of guidelines to maintain continuity at the meetings.
- * A total of 8 members who have volunteered to take the minutes at meetings in rotation.
- * There is a defined Finance Group of 3 members who manage the Finances. This is necessary to control the Bank account.

Although the Social Group is not a Fundraising Group, moneys have been donated to the Group at various events. Over the past year the Social Group has organised 4 events:-

- Easter Brunch
- Haggis Drive
- Scottish Night
- Christmas Brunch

The Social Group has also assisted at the Organ Recital Fundraising event, which was organised by the Organ Fundraising Group.

During 2013 the following events are planned:-

- The Easter Brunch was held on Sunday 31st March, with over 100 members of the congregation and visitors enjoying a variety of soups, sandwiches, tea, coffee and soft drinks. A Craft event and Easter Egg Hunt were organised for the children.
- The Social Group will also again assist in the Organ Concert on Saturday 1st June, which is being organised by the Organ Fundraising Group.
- A "Something" Drive (Beetle/Panda/Crocodile) is planned for Saturday 31st August.
- A second Christmas Brunch is planned for Sunday 15th December.

All these events are co-ordinated by a small group of volunteers, with all members of the Social Group playing their parts as agreed, before and on the date of the event.

The Social Group will continue to evolve, with the main aim of the members to develop friendship and fellowship amongst all those individuals, who are associated, in any way, with Maxwelltown West Church and to provide a warm welcome to visitors.


