Kirk Session

Since the last report, Session has held two ordinary meetings. At the first, on 13th November, several items of regular business were transacted. However, most time was taken up with business concerning the vacancy.

The production of an Electoral Register, which was mentioned in the last edition of "Contact", was duly completed and attested by Presbytery. A visit by the Presbytery Committee led by Rev. David Bartholomew was later followed by a lengthy discussion about a Nominating Committee. As you will realise, Session decided to have a Committee of thirteen members and to hold a secret ballot to elect them. This was held after Communion on Sunday 1st December when the following were elected to serve:-

T Bryden, R Fraser, P Hyles, D Johnson, D McLeod, J Marchbank, E Riddick, D Rosie, F Saddington, B Shepherd, C Singleton, J Smith and A Stott. It is interesting to note that three of these served in the previous Vacancy Committee in 1983. The Nominating Committee will have met at least twice by the time this goes to print and there is a separate report from them in this edition.

The group which was set up by Session to produce a Parish Profile for the Nominating Committee has completed its work, with one or two amendments to be made and a final proof reading to be done. At its January meeting Session approved the Profile subject to these amendments being made.

A meeting in mid November saw the election of three new deacons: L Hyles, K McMillan and F Rogerson.

Deacons' Court

The Deacons' Court met on 20th November. In the absence of the Rev. Donald Campbell, Mr. Tom Bryden was elected to chair the meeting and it was with sadness that he announced the death that morning of Joan McMillan.

The Treasurer's report showed total income, year to date, of £81,300, while for the same period the total expenditure amounted to £84,108 - an over spend of a little under £3,000, due mainly to a reduction in "Gift Aid" and additional costs of the Manse for heating. The "New Organ Fund" has raised in excess of the £30,000 target and the "Fabric Appeal Fund" is once again above the £100,000 figure.

The Finance Committee reported that an exemption from Council Tax for the Manse has been secured until September 2014.

J Marchbank has retired as the Finance Committee Secretary after many years of service and the Finance Committee are seeking a volunteer to take on this role.

D Miller gave a comprehensive report from the Fabric Committee covering the planned work.

D Rosie, on behalf of the Organ Fund Committee, thanked everyone for their help and support and the Social Group for their input. As the Organ Fund Committee is now disbanding, the Court thanked David and the committee for their work. This has been a tremendous effort by the committee and their helpers.

It is hoped that the After Sunday Service Tea & Coffee will continue fortnightly after the New Year and volunteers are required if this is to happen. Please add your name to the rota or contact the organiser, L Hyles.

The next meeting of the Deacons' Court will be Wednesday 12th March 2014.

I would like to welcome L Hyles, K McMillan and F Rogerson as newly appointed deacons. We look forward to your help and support.

Finally, I would like to thank A Walter and the Balliol Consort Choir for giving a truly memorable concert. It was enjoyed by all who attended and raised £150, as a finale for the Organ Fund.

The Deacons' Court met for an emergency meeting on 12th January, concerning the boiler and heating system breakdown. There has been an electrical fire in the boilers which has destroyed the boiler. Whilst we are looking into a possible insurance claim, it was felt that we could not await the outcome if we are to continue to use the buildings.

It is estimated that the cost of replacement will be in excess of £20,000 but we have no choice but to proceed as the weather is not in our favour at this time. There may also be some issues with removal of old asbestos from the boiler room and these are to be addressed as well

The Deacons' Court decided that the work should go ahead and it is hoped that we will be back to normal within the next 3 weeks, hopefully well before you read this.

Our thanks are extended to D Miller, D Wood and B Wilson for their work on this issue and keeping us going.

Our Vacancy

Finally, after many months of discussions and counter-proposals within Presbytery, Maxwelltown West was given permission to call a Minister on an Unrestricted Tenure. On Sunday 1st December 2013 a meeting of the congregation was held after the morning service to elect thirteen members from the Electoral Register of our church to form a Nominating, or Vacancy Committee. The names of those elected already appear in the Session report. Our Interim Moderator, Rev. Donald Campbell, will act as Adviser to the Committee, giving us important guidance and help. At our first meeting, D Johnson was elected as Convener and F Saddington as Clerk to the Committee.

The primary duty of the Nominating Committee is to nominate one person to the Congregation with a view to his or her election and appointment as Minister, having prepared a job description, our Parish Profile and advertised our vacancy. The Committee will then consider applications and interview prospective Ministers. It is the sole and total responsibility of the Nominating Committee to find and recommend to the congregation a suitable Nominee. With so many vacancies throughout the Church of Scotland, and forty percent of Parishes in our own Presbytery vacant, we are realistic about the difficulty of the task ahead, but we have an enthusiastic and committed community church keen to move us forward confidently into our future.

To date, the Nominating Committee has held two meetings -3^{rd} December and 16^{th} January with more scheduled for February and March. We will keep the congregation informed of our work throughout the nominating process.

Thus far we have discussed and made decisions on our Parish Profile, which can be accessed at www.maxwelltownwest.org.uk, and how best to advertise our vacancy. An advertisement will appear in the March edition of "Life and Work", which will include a link to our church website. Every Church of Scotland Minister will be e-mailed an advertisement "flier": also we are looking at setting up a church "Facebook" page.

The Committee is anxious to use every available and appropriate means to generate interest in our Vacancy. We would be pleased to hear from any member of the congregation of any Minister who may be interested in an informal approach from the Committee. We continue to pray for God's guidance in our task in finding our new Minister and we ask for wisdom and discernment in our eventual choice of sole nominee.

Bondo: It is especially good to report the great progress that has been made with our help and following on from latest reports from the Slacks in the Winter Contact. Bondo children have enjoyed a Christmas party. Thanks to our Brownies who raised £198.60, Sharon is having the vital medicine she needs. Generally the children are much healthier now they have clean water, toilets and better food.

Winnie is making progress with growing kale and soon will be selling it locally. She plans to finish the building on the church/school and eventually hopes to educate the children up to primary 6.

Mathia: John in Mathia tells us four students have now graduated, with six others still studying and four more going to university this year. Education is a priority with them and our support has been greatly appreciated.

Their church sub-division has now taken place with only five congregations in the parish instead of twelve in the past. They send us New Year greetings and prayers for us to find a new minister soon.

I would like to thank everyone who supports our projects and especially those people who have responded to our Christmas Gift Catalogue, as your donations will enable us to continue helping our Kenyan friends.

Maxwelltown West Church History - Ministers of our Church

The first Minister of our Church (1844-53) was the Rev William B. Clark

William Clark, a native of Biggar, was the youngest son of William Clark, a merchant of Biggar, and his wife Janet Brown. William was born in 1805 and was educated at Biggar Parish School. In 1822 he entered Edinburgh University where he studied for the ministry under Thomas Chalmers who was one of the leaders of the Great Disruption of 1843. William Brown Clark graduated Doctor of Divinity and was licensed by the Presbytery of Biggar in 1832.

He was assistant minister at Old Greyfriars, Edinburgh until 1839 when he was presented and ordained to the charge of Half Morton.

In 1836 he married Janet Brown from Biggar in St Cuthbert's Church, Edinburgh. They had two daughters, Elizabeth Glover Clark born 1839 and Bethia Barbara born 1842.

In July 1843 the new congregation of Maxwelltown approached the Rev. Clark to ask if he would be willing to be their minister. He immediately became involved in setting up the new church, speaking at the laying of the foundation stone for the new church building under construction in Laurieknowe. Negotiations on his move to Maxwelltown were to take a year before he was inducted in June 1844.

The 9 years the Rev. Clark spent at Maxwelltown was a time of sustained activity. A Manse was built behind the church in 1846; this building is still in use as a private house. The 1851 census shows the Rev. Clark, his wife Janet, his two daughters, Janet's sister, a governess, a cousin of Janet's and a servant, living in the Manse. During this time the church also purchased a building in David Street for conversion into a school. The School was managed by the office-bearers and the first teacher was appointed in 1847.

Early in 1853 The Rev. Clark was approached by a Mr. James Gibb representing the newly established Chalmers Church in Quebec, with a view to him becoming their first Minister. The Rev. Clark left for Canada early in 1853, with his family following him to Quebec later that year.

The Rev. Clark did not have a happy start to his life in Canada. On arrival there was a dispute about the method of his appointment which had to be resolved by the Synod. He was finally ordained at the end of 1853.

Shortly after her arrival in Canada, Janet Clark who suffered from ill health, died. The Rev. Clark continued as minister of Chalmers Church Quebec for 19 years, until 1874.

William married Amelia Torrance, widow of James Gibb's brother, Thomas, in 1870.

In 1889 William was Professor of Church History in Morrin College, Quebec, and in 1889 he became Doctor of Divinity in Montreal.

Amelia Died in 1890. The Reverend William Brown Clark died in 1893, aged 88, at the home of his daughter Bethia.

In 1870 when he was minister of Chalmers Church, William's daughter Bethia married James Moodie, a farmer of Scottish origin. They had 7 children. William's youngest grandchild, William Brown Clark Moodie, died in France in 1917. Bethia died in 1921 aged 79. Her sister Elizabeth who never married, died in 1919, aged 80.

The speaker give a very factual talk on the Dunscore girl, Jane Haining, who became matron at a Jewish girls' school in Budapest and was arrested in 1944 by the Nazis and died in Auschwitz. A memorial to her now stands in Dunscore. In February, at the afternoon meeting, we will hear about "life in the prison service".

March 1st will bring our Coffee Morning to fund our project "Out of Africa and into Malta", which will help St. Andrews Church which is struggling to cope with hundreds of refugees fleeing from civil war in Africa. Our March speaker will give a fuller account. The committee thank you for the support at the last coffee morning which allowed us to allocate £500 to church funds for Ministry and Mission, £400 to the Fabric Fund and £50 each to Christian Aid, Leprosy Mission, Bible Society and locally, Headway House. Please come along to the next Coffee Morning on 1st March and enjoy meeting friends old and new as well as helping our project along.
