We also have an After Eights group, a branch of the Guild and, for older members, a Good Companions group, a Social Team and Badminton Clubs to enhance fellowship, and a dedicated Parish Visitors Team to keep the housebound in the care of, and in contact with, the Church family. Our World Church team works hard to ensure that our two partner communities in Kenya are prospering. There is a study group during Lent and a bi-monthly Prayer group. We have good buildings, are well sited and are a financially solvent congregation.

And, we are a congregation not sitting back resting on our laurels but always looking for new ways of outreach in the parish. Reading this and knowing the Church as I do - IF only I could apply, you would top my list!!!!!

#### **Kirk Session**

The Kirk Session has met for two ordinary meetings, on 13th March and 16th April, since the last issue of "Contact" and a number of items were discussed.

Both meetings dealt mainly with routine items of business. However, one important issue discussed was that of safeguarding, a subject which will continue to occupy Session. Both meetings received progress reports from the Nominating Committee. The April meeting received reports on visits to the various Church organisations which showed them all to be in good heart. The reports as usual raised several items for discussion. These visits are an extremely important link with Session, providing it with an insight into the various groups linked to the Church and lets them see that Session is interested in their work.

#### **Deacons' Court**

The Deacons' Court met on the 12<sup>th</sup> March 2014. The Rev Donald Campbell chaired the meeting with 31 members in attendance.

D McNay, the Treasurer, presented the Annual Statement of Accounts for 2013. Copies are available for anyone wishing to see them. The accounts remain in a healthy state, but we should not be complacent as we still have to replace the cost of the new boilers. (See back cover for colour photos.)

H Johnson was appointed as a member of the Finance Committee.

D Miller gave a full update on the boiler replacement and presented the proposed Fabric Budget for the next year. This is expected to be £37,410 including the cost of the new boilers and we are still hopeful that the insurers will reimburse some of the £20,000 spend. However it does not include any work which may be required to the Manse when a new minister is appointed. A vote of thanks was extended to D Miller, B Wilson, I McLauchlan and D Wood for their time and input during the boiler replacement.

D Miller highlighted that he is the 'Acting' Fabric Convenor and we urgently require someone to take on the role of Fabric Convenor.

J Love has enquired from the other churches in the area what they charge for hire of their halls etc. The Court reviewed the Hall letting charges and decided that they are in line with others.

The installation of Broadband was discussed and it was decided not to proceed with this at present but it would be kept under review and open to discussion should a good case be presented as to its use within the Church.

#### **World Church Team**

#### **Bondo News**

Good progress has been made in Bondo since we last wrote for Contact. Winnie reports that the kale project is doing well despite the long drought which has resulted in returns being down by about 22%. However from the proceeds of the kale sales, two teachers have been employed at the Happy Tots School (set up by Winnie) and they have also managed to pay off the roof debt for the building for classes 1 - 3. The school is being registered with the Kenyan Government at a cost of ksh 60,000 (approx GBP 500) and this will be paid by instalment from kale sales. Each child in the school has also received a pair of plimsoles from the Red Cross through their antijigger campaign!!

Sharon is now improving after a spell of illness/hospitalisation and back to school although her performance has suffered as a result of her absence. The World Church Team is still supporting her by sending money to assist with her medication.

There has been a decline in the fishing project and this is causing major concerns regarding the livelihood of some of the locals.

Funding has been supplied to assist with setting up a library in the school and Winnie is keen to buy a selection of books, especially Bible Stories for the children.

We continue to value your support, as without this we could not keep assisting our friends in Bondo and we thank you for this.

### **Mathia Faith Partnership**

Our link with Mathia Church continues in faith. The congregation of our Kenyan partners write that "We feel that we have every good reason to share.. [the celebration of Easter].. with you." They continue to pray for us in our search for a new minister, "trusting in the Lord that He will take you through."

Previously, Mathia in Kiangai Parish, was one of 12 congregations looked after by the Reverend Erastus, who is due to retire at the end of this year. Now, after reorganisation, he has 5 congregations, and in the near future the Presbytery will move to a time of "the Right to Call", when every parish will be allowed to call a minister of their own choosing, with a ten year maximum tenure. In another initiative, the PCEA (Presbyterian Church of East Africa) office of the General Assembly has decided that an age limit of 35-59 years should be applied to the post of Synod Moderator.

Three quarters of the church building reconstruction undertaken at Mathia is now complete, and how big it looks too from the pictures we have received. A bigger church is needed for a growing congregation. Max West helped with cash donations to help purchase tiles and cement for their new building.

Our annual Bursary Fund of £1000 which assists Mathia young people with their higher education fees will have been sent for the coming academic year by the time 'Contact' appears. Over the years, this Bursary Fund has assisted a total of 18 young graduates. Higher education is much in demand in Kenya, as their young people seek to give their knowledge and talents back to their society.

Our main fund-raiser for our Kenyan projects, a Quiz Night, will have taken place on May 19th, when we hope that many of our supporters will have helped our fund-raising efforts.

Mathia congregation, through their Chairman and Senior Elder, John Njeru, who has visited us twice here at Max West, wishes us "All the best in all that you do. May God bless you" - a blessing which we, in return, send to our partners and friends in Mathia.

# Maxwelltown Free Church School 1847-1873



During the ministry of the Reverend William Brown Clark, the first minister of Maxwelltown Free Church (1844-1853), and the stewardship of Mr. Philip Forsyth, Session Clerk (1844-1873) the church set up a school in Maxwelltown.

In 1847 a building on the corner of King Street and David Street in Maxwelltown was purchased by the church for conversion into a School and Schoolhouse. The cost of the building and its conversion into a school was £363 paid for jointly by the Free Church, the Government and the Congregation of Maxwelltown.

The outline of the school is shown on the 1850 Town Plan.

The buildings can be viewed on Google Street View. They are now 2 small houses. The school was managed by a committee appointed by the Deacons' Court of the Church.

In 1847, the quarterly fees to be charged were approved by the Deacons' Court as follows:-

Reading 2/Reading and Writing 2/6d
Reading, Writing and Arithmetic 3/For the above with Grammar and Geography 3/6d
For Latin with all of the above 5/For Latin and Greek with all of the above 7/6d

The costs are quoted in old British money.

Provision was also made for the children of poor families to be educated at a reduced cost, or free.

The first teacher was Mr. Thomas Smellie. He was paid £30 per annum - half paid by the Church and half by the Government.

In 1851 John Thompson Smith was appointed as a Teacher at the school. He remained there until his death in December 1855, aged 32, from a heart attack. He died in the school house.

In 1853 an educational bequest was left to the Church by a Mr. John Carrick. The annual interest was valued at £76 12s 9d - 2/3 to be paid to the teacher and 1/3 to pay for prizes for the pupils.

In 1869 mention was made in the deacon's court minutes of cleaning and repairs to the school building. In May 1873 the school and school master's house was transferred to the School Board of Troqueer. In 1878 the School Board sold the buildings and after a dispute and reference to an arbiter, the church received £230 as settlement of their interest.

# **Commonwealth Games Report**

The mascot, which I must say is a lot better than the Olympic mascots, was designed by a teenager from a North Lanarkshire school.

It is all very exciting again.

#### Children's Corner




