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# Rev Johannes

n our visit to Harris and Lewis I was very impressed by the fact that on a Sunday virtually all commercial activity ceases. When you go to Harris and Lewis you should always try to stay over a Sunday. For the quiet and calm there on a Sunday is really something special and wonderful.

From Germany I am used to closed shops on a Sunday. The German "Shop Closing Law" compels businesses to close on Sundays and Christian holidays. Nevertheless, museums, leisure centres, restaurants, cafes and filling stations are open so that there are still many places where you can go on a Sunday. In fact, the Sunday can be a very busy day.

But that is different on Harris and Lewis. Everything is closed on Sundays, even playgrounds. The only public building that is open is a church!

The reason for this ban is the fourth commandment: "Remember the Sabbath and keep it holy." Of course, the Sabbath in the Jewish tradition is the seventh day of the week and that is the Saturday. But since Jesus rose from the dead on the first day of the week, the Christians celebrate Jesus' resurrection on a Sunday and accordingly keep the Sunday holy. But what does it mean to keep a day holy?



▶ God is holy as it is stated in Leviticus 19:2, "Be holy because I, the Lord your God, am holy." Since God is holy, everything that belongs to him is holy as well. When a day is regarded as holy then this means that this day belongs to God. He alone is in command of this day. And that makes this day so special.


Six days of the week our activity is demanded, and we have to decide upon so many things. Time is given to us that we make something of it. But that also means that we have to bear the responsibility for what we do and what we fail to do. But that is different on a Sunday when the perspective changes completely. For this day belongs to God. We are not the masters of this day. And the time of a Sunday is not given to us but to God. We are unburdened from our responsibilities and that is why we can find rest on a Sunday. Six days of the week are given for our activity, but there is one day where we are reminded that all our activity is based on God's activity alone. This finds its expression in the most passive human activity – at least when you look from the outside on it – and that is prayer.

During the week it can be difficult to find the time for prayer. But the Sunday is the day of prayer. We need to keep the Sunday holy because that keeps us aware that we are mere human beings. Even if we who are created in God's image can mirror his creativity in our own works, we are nevertheless not the creator but part of his creation. If the Sunday is no longer kept as a holy day then we are in danger to overextend ourselves and to finally usurp God's position. That is why the fourth commandment is an explanation of the first and second commandment, "You shall have no other gods but me. You shall not make for yourself any idol." We are always in danger to look at us as if we were God and as if we were the masters of our life. Then we worship ourselves as idols.

Here in Dumfries, it is different to what I learned on Harris and Lewis. For many people here the Sunday is a working day. We cannot simply change this. But nevertheless, we can try to bring the calm of Sunday into our houses and gardens and make this day a special day following God's example:

"By the seventh day God had finished the work he had been doing; so on the seventh day he rested from all his work. Then God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it he rested from all the work of creating that he had done." (Genesis 2:2-3)

## **Mission Plan**

for the former Presbytery of Dumfries and Kirkcudbright Progress thus far 23rd July 2023

At the meeting of the Presbytery of the South West held in Kilmarnock on 10<sup>th</sup> June 2023, the Mission Plan for the former Presbytery of Dumfries and Kirkcudbright was approved.

This was the original Mission Plan of March 2023 which proposed that Maxwelltown West be United with Lochend and New Abbey Church. Since then the Presbytery Mission Plan Implementation Group have also approved the Mission Plan, and a "Specific Purpose" meeting will be held via "Zoom" on

Tuesday 1st August at which, we hope, the Mission Plan will receive "Concurrence" from the Faith Action Programme Leadership Team.

Final approval of the Mission Plan, which includes the Uniting of Maxwelltown West and Lochend and New Abbey Churches will then mean that the process of its implementation can begin.

# Sunday School Grips of Uesteryear ~ by Kathleen McMillan

"The morning was dull, and the heavy clouds threatened a repetition of the rain of the previous days, but by noon, the sun shone and the afternoon was warm and bright."



Just as today, the Scottish summer weather in July determined the success of the annual Sunday School trips in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century. In July 1890 the Maxwelltown Free Church children and accompanying teachers and friends set off for Main Hills farm near Lochanhead on a special steam train from Maxwelltown Station to enjoy a fun filled day, until leaving for home around 7.00 pm.


Sunday school trips or annual outings during the late 1800s took place on Thursdays. At that time the numbers of children on these Maxwelltown Free Church Sabbath School trips

numbered between 100 and 200. The usual time for setting off was around noon and they would often not return to the Church until after 9.00 pm, depending on where they had visited.



Teachers, parents and members of the congregation accompanied these children who would often have to march in procession to Dumfries or Maxwelltown train stations.

Landowners and farmers welcomed



The children tucked into tea and buns on arrival in the afternoon and refreshments again around 5.00 pm. In between, they played games. During the 1889 trip at the Farm of Talloquhairn, "a series of skipping, spelling &c was organised for the girls" by the female teachers, while the male teachers ran "competitions in running, jumping and football, and other sports for the boys." Before departing, a hymn was sung, and the "loud huzzas of vouthful voices" demonstrated how much the children had enjoyed their day.



Sunday 7th May 2023: King Charles III had been crowned the previous day; Queen of the South had won their final match of the season, and as a celebration with royal connections a walk along the Jubilee Path between Rockcliffe and Kippford was organised. The path was so named to commemorate Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee and the land we walked through is managed by The National Trust for Scotland to encourage wildlife and recreation.

Twenty five of us, church members and Ukrainian friends, had set out from Dumfries in brilliant warm sunshine but by the time we reached Rockcliffe's top car park the clouds had rolled in and a chilly wind was blowing onshore from the Solway. Undeterred, we walked along the Jubilee Path through mixed woodland, with our senses sharpened by the fragrance of wild garlic and bluebells. Wild flower meadows here support the local butterfly population.


Coffee, tea and cake was enjoyed at The Anchor in Kippford, whose customers were treated to our rousing rendition of the Joe Cocker classic "With a little help from my friends", sung with real passion.

The Eurovision Song Contest should have been held in Ukraine this May, but the Russian invasion prevented this. Eurovision fans were encouraged to send in videos of themselves singing "With a little help..." I found the whole experience strangely moving.

We returned to Rockcliffe by way of the cockle beach, the Coastguard cottages and the Mote of Mark, passing by Scotland's Tree of the Year 2022, which sometimes features as the background to our Intimations at Max West. Thanks to all who made the afternoon such a memorable one. The singing was awesome!

As an alternative to the continuation of the "Faith Courses" during the summer months, a series of "Faith Walks" was proposed.

The first of these was held on the evening of Friday 19th May at the Crichton estate. About a dozen of us met at the Crichton Church through the good offices of David Matheson. Johannes led a short service in the church, which included two appropriate and resonant hymns for what was to follow: prayers and a Reflection which encouraged us to "Stop, Look and Listen". This we duly did as we meandered through the Crichton gardens and Arboretum which is home to mature specimens of unusual and rare trees such as the Pocket

Handkerchief Tree (right) [Davidia involuerata], the Tulip Tree [Liliodendron tulipifera], the Paper Back Maple [Acer griseum] and

the Chilean Fire Bush [Embothrium coccineum]. We wondered at the sheer variety of the natural world here on our doorstep. Our fellowship was all the more meaningful due to this shared experience as we wandered, stopped, looked and listened.



Our second walk took place in June

at the Dalswinton estate. We started at Dalswinton Barony Church, the "Tin Tabernacle", the last remaining example of a "flat pack" church, a Victorian IKEA, ordered in 1881 from a missionary catalogue. Johannes led our short service and Reflection at the lochside. Thereafter we wandered around the loch, noting the


first steamboat replica, the original castle and the doocot, taking care not to step on hundreds of tiny frogs that were making their way towards the loch and safety. It was a beautifully calm evening which matched our mood perfectly.

Our next "Faith Walk" will

be centred on Ruthwell Church with its 18-foot high stone Anglo-Saxon preaching cross which is thought to date from the 8<sup>th</sup> century and is one of Scotland's rarest treasures.

All are welcome to join us for these evenings of reflection, conversation and fellowship.

We had a visit to Dumfries Museum and were joined by the families of Axsa, Lucy,

Molly and Susie for their Promise Celebrations. Afterwards the girls enjoyed looking around

the museum and completing the trails.

On another sunny evening we had a walk around the town centre and saw one of the "Guid Nychburris Rideouts". We waved at Ellie, this year's Cornet Lass. She was a Maxwelltown West Brownie a few years ago. We also went to see the recently refurbished fountain on the High Street.

The sunny weather continued for the Max West Family Garden Party and BBQ

which the Brownies enjoyed. This followed the Family Service where they were happy to sing "This Little Brownie Light of Mine" to the congregation.

Our last meeting in the hall was a celebration of Mrs Irene Johnstone's 50 years' Long Service Award from Girlguiding. Mrs Johnstone invited some of her Girlguiding friends. Rev Johannes gave a great summary of her Girlguiding career and then everyone had fun at our Beltie Drive – our version of a Beetle Drive, using our Beltie County Badge emblem. After that there were songs and refreshments, followed by the presentation of end of term



The final meeting of term was held in Dock Park. We enjoyed eating our picnic tea together before playing parachute games and walking around the park. The Brownies are currently enjoying their holidays. We resume on 29th August when some new girls will be joining us.

## SERVICES AT LOCHDUHAR CARE HOME

Lochduhar Care Home lies within the parish of Maxwelltown West. There has been a long-standing tradition of a Church of Scotland religious service being held at Lochduhar since it opened, and when Johannes became our minister the services continued, but not without several interruptions because of Covid-19 restrictions.

The service is held on the last Thursday of every month, except for December when Max West's carol singers entertain. The service begins at 2:30 p.m., and around 20 of Lochduhar's residents accompanied by staff attend. 

The sailors raised the red flag and tried to ignite the revolution in their home port of Odesa. Directed by Sergei Eisenstein it's regarded as a masterpiece of the cinema.

## Fri 24 Nov: A YAK IN THE CLASSROOM (BHUTAN 2019)

A young teacher in modern Bhutan shirks his duties while planning to go to Australia to become a singer. As a reprimand, his superiors send him to the most remote school in the world, a Himalayan village called Lunana, to complete his service. He finds himself exiled from his Westernized comforts after an arduous 8-day trek just to get there. With no electricity, no textbooks, not even a blackboard, the villagers extend a warm welcome to their new teacher, but he faces the daunting task of teaching their youngsters without any supplies. He wants to quit and go home, but he begins to learn of the hardship in the lives of the beautiful children he teaches, and begins to be transformed through the amazing spiritual strength of the villagers. A drama based on the true story of Liz Evans,
a hairdresser and leader of a youth theatre in

special premiere for Jurassic Park.
